Psalm 98 "The Lord has revealed to the nations his saving power."

2 Timothy 2:8-13 If, like Christ, we hold out even to death, we will reign with Christ.

Luke 17:11-19 Ten lepers show faith in obeying the Lord, but in thankfulness one goes a step farther-straight into the Kingdom of God.

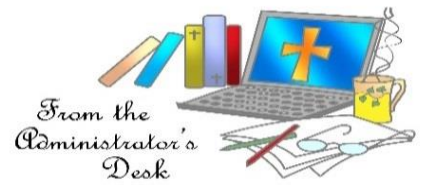

Dear Parishioners:



- October is dedicated to praying the Rosary: *The Rosary is a magnificent and universal prayer for the needs of the Church, the nations and the entire world.” Pope John XXIII.* The month of October is dedicated to the Rosary. Our Lady of the



feast was instituted by Pope St. Pius V in thanksgiving for the great naval victory over the Turks at the battle of Lepanto on this day in the year 1570, a favor due to the recitation of the Rosary. Lepanto, perhaps the most complete victory ever gained over the Ottoman Empire, on October 7, 1571, is commemorated by the invocation "Help of Christians," inserted in the Litany of Loretto. At Belgrade the Turks were defeated on the Feast of Our Lady ad Nives in 1716. A second victory gained that year on the Octave of the Assumption determined Pope Clement XI to command the Feast of the Rosary to be celebrated by the universal Church. Leo XIII added the invocation "Queen of the most Holy Rosary, pray for us," to the Litany of Loretto. The Feast is in reality a great festival of thanksgiving for the signal and countless benefits bestowed on Christendom through the Rosary of our blessed Queen. In modern times successive popes have urged the faithful to pray the Rosary. It is a form of contemplative prayer, mental and vocal prayer, which brings down God's blessing on the Church. It is a biblically inspired prayer which is centered on meditation on the salvific mysteries of Christ in union with Mary, who was so closely associated with her Son in his redeeming activity. *“The rosary is the book of the blind, where souls see and there enact the greatest drama of love the world has ever known; it is the book of the simple, which initiates them into mysteries and knowledge more satisfying than the education of other men; it is the book of the aged, whose eyes close upon the shadow of this world, and open on the substance of the next. The power of the rosary is beyond description.” – Archbishop Fulton Sheen. – From the USCCB.* Let us all take time every day to pray the Rosary for our church, her priests, illness, famine, unemployment, and for world peace.

When we pray to our Father in Heaven, He hears us especially through the intercession of His Blessed Mother. Beloved of God,



A number of years ago, in my first parish, parishioners joined me as we went into New York City to participate in a new form of evangelization for Pro-Life education called *The Life Chain*. We gathered along Fifth Avenue south of the Cathedral of Saint Patrick holding placards with various sayings. We

were informed that a protest against our moral and just cause would be passing by on the other side of the avenue on which we were standing. In an attempt to protect or shield a young parishioner during the protest, I had her stand near me. At that time of my priesthood, I did not realize what a target “the priestly collar” would be. As those protesting drew closer and passed, I was very upset for this young person because she saw more than she would have if she were standing in another position. That day, Evil walked down Fifth Avenue. The anger and hatred that was coming from those souls was unnerving. To this day I have not forgotten that moment... and they are remembered in my prayers.

In years gone by when *The Life Chain* was done in other parishes I was assigned to, there were periodic honks of support, thumbs up or peace signs as cars passed by. There were also a number of occupants of cars that disagreed with our stance and let us know their opinions in a variety of ways. One most troubling was a man in his 50's who found it necessary to extend his hand with his middle finger up the entire route the supporters of Life Rights were stationed. This wasn't my first time seeing or being given this vulgar gesture. What upset me the most was that, the man had his two children in the car. What an unfortunate lesson he taught. What a sad day in his parenting.

In one of my previous assignments, as the hour was drawing to a close, a car of young people stopped across the street from us. Because of lessons learnt in Manhattan those many years ago, my eyes are always watching for any possible difficult moment... wanting to protect those with me on the front line. A couple of young women went into a video store while a young man started walking across street onto the sidewalk and approached me. The young man introduced himself and asked what this was all about. I explained that we were making an attempt to remind people as the sign I was holding said, “Abortion Kills Children.” He said, “Really?” I asked him if he had seen any recent science regarding children in the womb and recalled to him a GE commercial a few years ago that was showing new filming technology which showed with great clarity of picture the unborn child at about 4-6 months. Not surprisingly, the commercial was pulled rather quickly. He then asked what the other poster meant about “Abortion Harms (Hurts) Women.” I explained that there are medical complications which arise from the procedure as well as the inability to conceive as a result of the abortion as well as any emotional and psychological scars that remain. I went on to say that a woman knows she has become a mother and has already started to bond with the life within her. Also, from my years in the confessional, the pain and torture of those who had procured an abortion is unbearable because they know they killed their child. I tried to come across as someone sane and concerned about both the mother and the child... as another of the posters stated, “Love Them Both.” The car he was in pulled up and I started to speak with the young ladies by asking them how their day was and wishing them a good rest of the weekend... all the while not hiding or dropping the sign, “Abortion Kills Children.” I offered to this young man the possibility of further conversations at any time and they (all three of them) are in my prayers.

Conversation, communication, and education bring about change. Please keep in your prayers that man with his children. May we all grow closer to God and may we do His will. “God is Pro-Life.”
