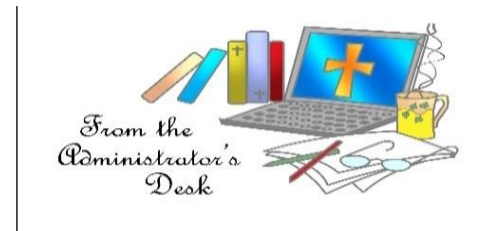

Beloved of God,

“For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be.” (Matthew 6:21)

I was truly saddened.

The day after returning from summer respite, and how restful were those eleven days, I found myself at the Metro North station taking the 8:15am into the city. This day was going to be a bit different for me, as one of the parishioners had pointed out that morning as we spoke briefly waiting for the train. It began with me not doing my prayers in our church, but on the train platform. (I am always amazed how people react when they do not see me “where I am supposed to be.” “Ah, Father, good morning...?” with a look of “Why are you here?”) The train ride was mostly uneventful as most commuters are hoping and maybe praying for. But again, I was saddened.

The Cathedral of Saint Patrick lay before me as my destination that morning. Just blocks up from Grand Central, a pleasant walk on most days. As I walked along Madison towards 50th there was briskness in the air, very similar to the morning of September 11, now 15 years ago. I’ll never forget that cloudless sky and that cool autumn feeling that seemed just a bit early. As yet, I have not been down to visit the “memorial” or the site of so much pain, destruction and sorrow. When in Germany, visiting the concentration camp Dachau, the pall of death was so pervasive that more than 60 years later, it chilled your spine. That feeling stays with me to this day. But, I digress. My destination was Saint Patrick Cathedral.

As I continued north up Madison I couldn’t help but notice that everyone was *dressed for work*. Suits. Ties. Dress Shirts. Dress shoes. Skirts. Dresses. Blouses. High heels. I began to think back to the beginning of my trip that 90% of all the people on the platform, and those on the train and the rest hurrying past me on the streets of New York City were in various stages of *dressed up*. They looked great. You could tell that care was taken in the morning ritual, or even the night before, to make sure that they presented a certain persona at their place of employment. Faces were shaven. Hair was coiffed. Shoes were shined. Shirts were worn and pressed. Pants had but a single crease. Skirts were ironed. The work purse was being used. (This is not to say that there wasn’t a fair share of laborers who were dressed appropriately as well.)

And then I thought about....Sunday Mass....and I was saddened. Don’t look around the church and pass judgement on others. Just look at yourself. Think about how you dress for work... and you are dressed now. How much time and effort do you spend in preparing yourself to see God this morning or any regular Sunday? Are your shoes polished? Is your shirt, skirt, blouse or pants pressed? Clean shaven? I will never forget the time I mentioned to a parishioner in another parish that “a bathing suit was not appropriate for Holy Mass” and his response of “You have no right to say anything to me.”

“For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be.” You may agree with that person, but if not me then who? Would you respond to Jesus in the same manner... “You have no right to say anything to me...” when He looks at your effort in coming to Holy Mass as compared to going to work and says... *“where your treasure is, there also will your heart be.”*
