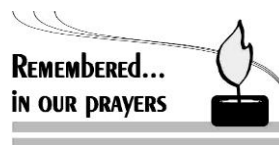

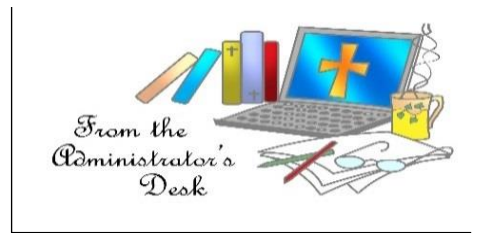

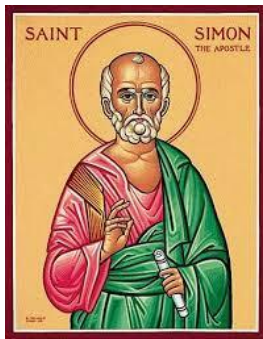
Dear Parishioners:



- Saint Eugene Choir: As stated in last week's bulletin we would like to start up again a Children's Choir which will sing everyweek at the 10:00 AM Family Mass. Practices will be at 9:30 each Sunday morning before Mass. We are looking for adults who are willing to lend their talent and join our Saint Eugene Adult Choir. The Choir Mass is the 12:00 Mass on Sundays. The practices are held on Sunday mornings at 11:00 AM. If you are interested in joining either choir please fill out the forms located in the back table of the church.

- The Air Ducts: The work is progressing on the air ducts in the church. When all of the air conditioners are cleaned they will again wrap them in heavy tarps for the winter months to prevent any water from entering into the church from the units. After the air conditioners are done they will begin the exhaust ducts located near the wood dividers. When Westchester Air Duct is done, Service Master will be in to clean and vacuum all of our windows and walls. We appreciate your cooperation during this process as some areas may be closed off in the church.

- Feast of Saints Simon & Jude, October 28th: However meager in details is the history of these glorious apostles, we learn from their brief legend how amply they contributed to this great work of generating sons of God. Without any repose, and even to the shedding of their blood, they "edified the body of Christ"; and the grateful Church thus prays to our Lord today: "O God, through the work of the apostles you have spoken your Word of



love, your Son, into our world's deafness. Open our ears to hear; open our hearts to heed; open our will to obey, that we may proclaim the good news with our lives." St. Simon is represented in art with a saw, the instrument of his martyrdom.



He is the patron Saint of tanners and curriers. St. Jude's square points him out as an architect of the house of God. Saint Jude is the patron Saint of the impossible and lost causes. St. Paul called himself by this name; and St. Jude, by his Catholic Epistle, has also a special right to be reckoned among our Lord's principal workmen. But our apostle had nobility, far surpassing all earthly titles: being nephew, by his father Cleophas or Alpheus, to St. Joseph, and legal cousin to the Man-God, Jude was one of those called by their compatriots the brethren of the carpenter's Son. We may gather from St. John's

Gospel another precious detail concerning him. In the admirable discourse at the close of the last Supper, our Lord said: "He that loveth Me, shall be loved of My Father: and I will love him and will manifest Myself to him." Then Jude asked Him: "Lord, how is it that Thou wilt manifest Thyself to us, and not to the world?" And he received from Jesus this reply: "If any one loves Me, he will keep My word, and My Father will love him, and We will come to him, and will make Our abode with him. He that loveth Me not keepeth not My word. And the word which you have heard is not Mine, but the Father's who sent Me." - *from the USCCB*.

- Election Day, November 8th: Archbishop Joseph Kurtz, president of the USCCB stated this week, "In our faith and Our Church, Christ has given us a precious gift. As Catholics, we hold onto our beliefs because they come to us from Jesus, not a consensus forged by contemporary norms. The Gospel is offered for all people for all times. It invites us to love our neighbor and live in peace with one another. For this reason, the truth of Christ is never outdated or inaccessible. The Gospel serves the common good, not political agendas." He continues, "I encourage my fellow Catholic brothers and sisters, and all people of good will, to be good stewards of the precious rights we have inherited as citizens of this country. We also expect public officials to respect the rights of people to live their faith without interference from the state. When communities lose this right, the very idea of what it means to be an American is lost. Politicians, their staff and volunteers should reflect our best aspirations as citizens. Too much of our current political discourse has demeaned women and marginalized people of faith. **This must change.** True to the best of our founding fathers, we are confident that we can do better as a nation." – Please pray for our nation as we enter the final days of this election.



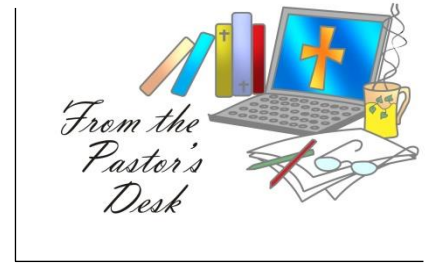

Beloved of God,



I am writing this the afternoon before the last presidential debate. I cannot recall so much conversation, debate, arguing – in effect –



media attention as well as dialoguing by the average person leading up to an election in recent history.

Some people have asked me how I am going to vote. Are they asking me as a person? Are they asking me as a Catholic? Are they asking me as a Priest/Pastor? Probably all of the above. One question I've thought on is..."Can I separate the Person from the Catholic from the Priest?" For

many politicians this seems an easy thing to do, especially when they say... "I am personally opposed to... but I will not let my personal opinions shape my public/political stance." We all know that this statement is completely false not only for politicians but for every person. Our personal views, our religious views, our family views and our personal experiences are involved in shaping who we are, how we think, what we believe and what we do. For example...

A dear friend, a graduate of Cardinal Hayes High School, was a strong *believer in Capital Punishment*. He was never rude in the explanation of his stance, but he was strong in expressing his views. His love for his Alma Mater, Hayes High School – "*Up Hayes and All It's Loyal Men*" – was equally strong so much so that his son also went to and graduated from Hayes. My friend held true to his belief in Capital Punishment until one tragic day... the day his son was shot and killed as an innocent bystander in a drive-by shooting. From that day on, he was *totally against* Capital Punishment. You may be thinking, but his son was just murdered, wouldn't he be a perfect example of a person advocating for Capital Punishment. One day I had the chance and the nerve to ask him why his belief changed in light of the fact that his only son had been killed. He looked at me eye to eye and said... "I would never want any other parent to go through the pain I went through."

So when a person asks me how I am going to vote, they must expect to hear an answer that is influenced by my personal experiences, my family values, my faith and my choice of answering the call from Almighty God to be a servant of His One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church. But does that predetermine my vote... so that freewill is taking away. It shouldn't for me or anybody else but some citizens say... "I always vote Republican...or I always vote Democrat!" Others say, "My grandparents were... my parents were... and I and my children will always be..." so they wouldn't think of voting any other way. Doesn't this actually sound like *not exercising your freewill*... that your vote is predetermined. And if the vote is predetermined... then there is no thinking about the issues, there is no thinking about the where the country is and where it could be... there is no thinking.

My friend from Cardinal Hayes had the opportunity with the murder of his son to just simply and instinctively react or to thoughtfully ponder and choose. As you are parents and grandparents, sons and daughters, workers with white or blue collars, male or female, faithfully believers in God and in Jesus Christ and members of the Roman Catholic Church Our Blessed Lord founded and nurtures to this day, in your preparations to vote, think using your freewill, think using your faith, think using the teachings of the Catholic Church, think using your family values, think using your study of the issues and then, please, please, please... PRAY before you vote.
