Dear Parishioners:

Ascension Thursday May 25th: The Feast of the Ascension of Our Lord and



Savior Jesus Christ, also known as Ascension Thursday, Holy Thursday, or Ascension Day, commemorates the bodily Ascension of Jesus into heaven. It is one of the ecumenical feasts (i.e.,

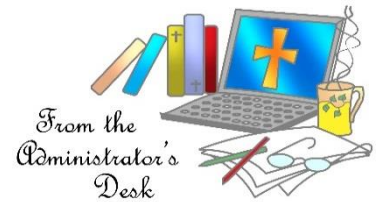
universally celebrated) of Christian churches, ranking with the feasts of the Passion, of Easter, and Pentecost. Ascension Day is traditionally celebrated on a Thursday, the fortieth day of Easter (following the count given in **Acts 1:3**), although some Christian denominations have moved the observance to the following Sunday. The Latin terms used for the feast, *ascensio* and, occasionally, *ascensa*, signify that Christ was raised up by his own powers, and it is from these terms that the holy day gets its name. In the Book of Common Prayer of the Anglican Communion, "Holy Thursday" is listed as another name for Ascension Day. In Western Christianity, the earliest possible date is April 30; the latest possible date is June 3. In Roman Catholicism, the Ascension of the Lord is a Holy Day of Obligation and in the Anglican Communion, Holy Thursday is a Principal Feast. The three days before Ascension Thursday are sometimes referred to as the Rogation days, and the previous Sunday the Sixth Sunday of Easter (or the Fifth Sunday after Easter) as Rogation Sunday - *from the USCCB. Almighty God, whose blessed Son our Saviour Jesus Christ ascended far above all heavens, that He might fill all things: Mercifully give us faith to perceive that according to his promise He abideth with his Church*

on earth, even unto the end of the world; through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

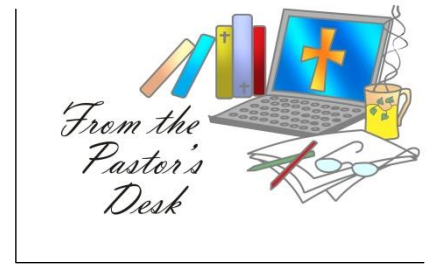

Eucharist Heart of Jesus Litany – Part 6C

“Heart of Jesus in the Eucharist, sweet companion of our exile, I adore You.”



So, what do the writings of Flavius Josephus, Pliny the Younger and Tacitus prove? Something very important. The *Human Being*, the *Man*, Jesus truly existed in time. This is verifiable by sources *inside* and *outside* the Sacred Scriptures, the Holy Bible. You might be thinking, “Yeah, so what?” Just as many people for generations believed the earth was flat, and some still do to this day (see <http://www.theflatearthsociety.org/home/>), some will still argue that Jesus of Nazareth (Matthew 21:11; Mark 1:24, 10:47, 16:6; Luke 4:34, 18:37; John 1:45; Acts 10:38) or Jesus the Carpenter (Matthew 13:55; Mark 6:3), did not exist in human/male form. This heresy was known as Docetism...

“A heretical sect dating back to Apostolic times. Their name is derived from *dokesis*, "appearance" or "semblance", because they taught that Christ only "appeared" or "seemed to be a man, to have been born, to have lived and suffered. Some denied the reality of Christ's human nature altogether, some only the reality of His human body or of His birth or death. The word *Docetae* which is best rendered by "Illusionists", first occurs in a letter of Serapion, Bishop of Antioch (190-203) to the Church at Rhossos, where troubles had arisen about the public reading of the apocryphal Gospel of Peter.” (www.newadvent.org)

With confidence the Catholic Church states...**1373** “Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised from the dead.” (Catechism of the Catholic Church [CCC]) Jesus of Nazareth did exist. As Flavius Josephus said...

“Jesus... performed surprising deeds and was a teacher... (who) won over many Jews and many of the Greeks... Pilate had condemned him to a cross... (after His death) appeared to them spending a third day restored to life.” Jewish Antiquities, 93 A.D., 18.3.3@63 www.josephus.org/testimonium.htm

The Church, with equal confidence and faith, goes on to say... **1373** “Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised from the dead, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us,” is present in many ways to His Church:¹⁹⁷ in His word, in His Church’s prayer, “where two or three are gathered in My name,”¹⁹⁸ in the poor, the sick, and the imprisoned,¹⁹⁹ in the sacraments of which He is the author, in the sacrifice of the Mass, and in the person of the minister. But “He is present . . . most especially in the Eucharistic species.”²⁰⁰

This Jesus, who was not only present during the time of Pontius Pilate, “is present in many ways to His Church.” The Jesus who once was... is still. The Book of Revelation puts it this way... “*I am the Alpha and the Omega,*” says the Lord God, “*the one who is and who was and who is to come, the almighty...*” (Rev. 1:8) and “*The One who sat on the throne said, “Behold, I make all things new.” Then he said, “Write these words down, for they are trustworthy and true.” He said to me, “They are accomplished. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end...*” (Rev. 21:5-6) and “*Behold I am coming soon. I bring with me the recompense I will give to each according to his deeds. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end.*” (Rev. 22:12-13)

This Jesus, who was perfectly and completely human, is also perfectly and completely Divine. He is the “Alpha and the Omega.” Jesus who is “the beginning and the end,” is also present in “the poor, the sick, and the imprisoned,” as well as the Sacraments of which “He is the author.” Jesus is present in the Eucharist.

God love you... Father Fernan
