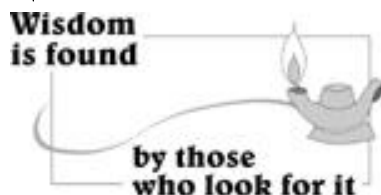

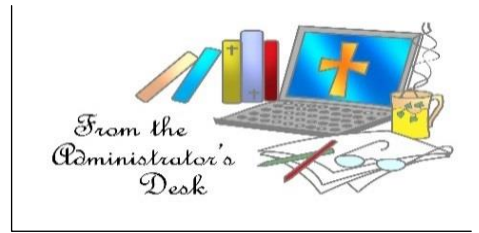
AREA EVENTS

Dear Parishioners:

- **Thanksgiving Food Drive:** As we are in the month of November and the Thanksgiving Season, let us remember those who are less fortunate than ourselves. The parish food drive, working with our Saint Vincent DePaul Society, will be November 1-19. We are collecting nonperishable items. They can be placed into the containers located at the church entrances. All the food collected will be distributed to Saint Joseph's Food Pantry in Yonkers. We will also be collecting frozen turkeys (10-14lbs.) and hams to be distributed to the Sharing Community. We will be collecting them on Monday morning, November 20, in the parking area near the adoration chapel from 9:30-10:30. *Give thanks in all circumstances: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. 1 Thessalonians 5:18.*
- **Saint Eugene Choir:** Each weekend under the direction of our Music Director, *Jerry Celestino* we are given the chance to lift our voices high in the Holy Mass. What is the importance of music and singing in the Mass? Music that blends both spiritual and artistic excellence is liturgical, it is sacred. Music has the ability to cultivate, strengthen, and deepen the spiritual experience of those gathered for worship. Liturgical music never dominates, but serves. Sacred music imparts spiritual truth to one's mind, heart, and soul. Singing is an expression of joy. *In Colossians 3:16, St. Paul exhorts the faithful assembled in expectation of their Lord's return to sing together. He says, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly., singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God."* Our relationship with God is one of love, and whether we sing loudly or softly, on pitch or out of tune, sing. We are preparing our program for the Advent and Christmas season, so please consider joining our music ministry. Our Children's Choir sings everyweek at the 10:00 AM Family Mass. Practices are held at 9:30 each Sunday morning before Mass. We are looking for adults who are willing to lend their talent and join our Saint Eugene Adult Choir. The Choir Mass is the 12:00 Mass on Sundays. The practices are held on Sunday mornings at 11:00 AM. If you are interested in joining either choir please see Mr. Celestino after one of the masses.
- **Saint Eugene Bake Sale:** Our 8th grade class will be conducting a Bake Sale which will take place next Sunday before and after the masses. The tables will be set-up in the long hallway, on the school side. Please stop and buy a tasty treat. The bake sale will help defray the cost of their 8th grade trips.

Prayer for peace and protection from violence and from terrorism

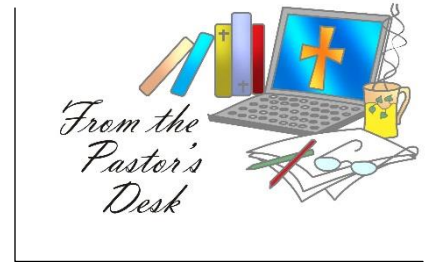

O Giver of life, we pray to You also for all those who have died as victims of brutal terrorist attacks. Grant them their eternal reward. May they intercede for the world that is torn apart by conflicts and disagreements. O Jesus, Prince of Peace, we pray to You for the ones who have been wounded in these acts of inhuman violence: children and young people, old people and innocent people accidentally involved in evil. Heal their bodies and hearts; console them with Your strength and, at the same time, take away any hatred and a desire for revenge. Texas church shooting: suspect named as at least 26 confirmed dead

“At least 26 people are dead and 20 are injured after a gunman opened fire on a congregation in a small town in Texas on Sunday. The number of dead at the First Baptist church in the small town 30 miles south-east of San Antonio made the killing the worst mass shooting in modern Texas history and one of the worst gun rampages in recent years. The lone shooter was found dead after he was chased by locals and police across county lines. “There are so many families who have lost family members, and it occurred in a church, in a place of worship,” the Texas governor, Greg Abbott, in a Sunday evening press conference. “That’s where these people were mown down. We mourn their loss.” Twenty-three worshippers died inside the church, two outside and one after being taken to hospital. Many more injured were still being treated. The ages of the dead ranged from five to 72.” (From the Internet)



You are reading about this in church, in pews similar to those on which those 46 souls were sitting on or standing next to while praising the Almighty God Father, Son and Spirit. They may have had in their minds and hearts similar if not the same prayers and concerns that you have brought this evening or morning before the same God. They have parents who are ill. They have loved ones who recently died. They may have just lost their job. They are wondering if this paycheck will make it through the week. They are wondering if the in-laws are going to be coming for Thanksgiving. They were saying, “I told junior to leave his Gameboy in the car.” Sitting next to them were their loved ones... parents, grandparents, children, relatives and friends. It was a chore getting everybody there on time, but this week it finally happened. One of their pastors had prepared for this worship event, praying to God and working with the musicians to choose the songs that would fit the scriptures and lift up all those who were going to gather. The musicians had practiced Thursday night from 7:00 -8:30 pm. The pastor had visited them and joined in on one of the songs. He was really looking forward to Sunday. After worship there was going to be soccer practices, fall baseball games, lunch at Denny’s and play dates with friends. Then came screaming, yelling, shooting, crying, death, pain and suffering.

When you first heard of this horror... what was your first thought? Be honest. Was it, “I’m glad they killed the shooter!” Was it, “If I had my gun I know what I would have done to that guy!” “Just give me ten minutes alone with him!” What was your first thought, your gut reaction? Was it, *“Eternal rest grant unto them O Lord. Let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in Peace. May their souls and all the souls of the faithfully departed rest in peace. Amen.”* Was it, *“Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with you. Blessed are you among women and blessed is the fruit of your womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of death, Amen.”* Did you offer one of the many forms of the Act of Contrition? Did you plead with God to have mercy on their souls? If prayer wasn’t your first reaction, have you prayed since?

In the Gospel of Luke (18:1-6), Jesus addressed a parable to the holy people of God... *Then Jesus told them a parable about the necessity for them to pray always without becoming weary. He said, “There was a judge in a certain town who neither feared God nor respected any human being. And a widow in that town used to come to him and say, ‘Render a just decision for me against my adversary.’ For a long time the judge was unwilling, but eventually he thought, ‘While it is true that I neither fear God nor respect any human being, because this widow keeps bothering me I shall deliver a just decision for her lest she finally come and strike me.’”*

We are supposed to be people of prayer. Our first reactions should be prayer. When a fire truck goes by your car, do you pray? When a police vehicle speeds past you, do you pray? When someone honks because you are “driving to slowly,” do you pray? When someone cuts in line ahead of you, do you pray? When someone trips and falls scattering packages, do you pray? When someone takes your pew in church, do you pray? We are supposed to be, we should be, we must be people of prayer.
